Principal's Message

The San Gorgonio High School (SGHS) Student Support Team (SST) takes pride in supporting our students and families. Our goal is to ensure an environment that embraces a safe climate allowing academic and social growth to prosper. These qualities are vital to our students' development of career and college readiness. SGHS offers a rigorous A-G curriculum, including Advancement via Individual Determination (AVID), Honors, and Advanced Placement (AP) programs which are key to career and college readiness. Our dedication to a safe learning climate and the efforts of our SST combined are largely responsible for attaining our goals of increasing college awareness, and increasing the number of students graduating with a Career Action Plan (CAP). We are in our third cohort of our Career Pathways Program. This program allows our students to choose from Career Technical Education (CTE) courses and embark upon their future with the ability to apply appropriate technical and academic skills. To ensure success in college and the workforce, our counseling department works with our students and parents to help students make a successful life transition. The SPARC is aligned with our Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) to raise the academic performance of all students.


Career and College Readiness Student Outcomes

Our SST believes in promoting the educational outcomes of our students. We use student outcomes to measure the effectiveness of programs to determine where changes can or should be made. This school year our CTE program was at full speed, with all career pathways available to our students, thus allowing us to provide multiple career options. SGHS also offers the AVID program where students receive additional skill building with a focus on organization and study habits.

Career Readiness


Members of the SST collaboratively teach and assist our students in developing an educational and career plan that aligns with their personal goals. Students are encouraged to participate in career pathways, concurrent enrollment, and workforce development courses. Additionally, in select CTE courses students earn college credit. The successful completion of a career pathway course is considered a "C" or better, signifying academic and career readiness in that particular course. This graph shows that the successful completion of selected pathway course areas of study for the 2020-2021 school year were Biomedical Sciences (176), Computer Technology (100), Hospitality and Tourism (69), Childcare Occupations (82), and Automotive Technology (68). Other CTE courses included Cadet Corps and Construction Occupations.





College Readiness

It is statistically proven that students enrolled in the AVID program are more likely to experience academic success in high school as well as move on to college. This program originally targeted first generation high school graduates, but all students are welcome to apply. Members of the SST monitor and coordinate placement in this program. Our AVID program offers teaching and learning strategies that encourage students to demonstrate creativity and innovation, while also modeling integrity, ethical leadership, and effective time management. The pie chart displays the number of students that have graduated from our AVID program beginning in 2018 with 108 graduates, 2019 (100), 2020 (72), and 2021 (67). Despite declining enrollment, the number of projected graduating AVID seniors this year is 77.



21st Century Skills

SGHS is committed to supporting students in the development of 21st century skills and helping them feel connected to their school experience. This valuable connection teaches students the importance of acting as a responsible citizen in the workplace and community. Members of the SST collaborate with the students, tutors and teachers, and provide enrollment for Youth Action Project (YAP) and Jobs for America's Graduates (JAG). Both YAP and JAG instill 21st century skills including, leadership, teamwork and self-management skills. Opportunities include work internships, college and employment preparation, life skills training, motivational activities, and parent and family workshops and activities. YAP was established in 2014 at SGHS and JAG was established in 2018.

Additional Achievements:

- AVID Highly Certified School.
- During the 2020-21 school year, 368 students were enrolled in one or more AP classes.
- The Class of 2021 graduates were awarded \$1,159,817 in scholarships/grant money.

Career and College Readiness School Site Programs and Community Partnerships

SGHS has a number of school site programs and community based partnerships which provide our students with opportunities to enrich their career pathway and college readiness experience. These partnerships demonstrate the importance of working productively in teams while integrating cultural and global competence and awareness. They also allow students to begin to understand the environmental, social, and economic impacts of decisions made for large groups of people whether in a school or the workplace. School Site Programs

- · Work Experience: On-site cafeteria employment, work permits, SBCUSD transition/workability program.
- YAP: Daily multi-subject after school tutoring and mentoring during the school day.
- Automotive Technology and Childcare: Offer college credit through San Bernardino Valley College.
- School Site Council: Academics, school safety, climate and culture, including parent members.
- JAG: School to career transition program including leadership development and career exploration.
- SGHS Summer School Program: Academic intervention and enhancement for students.

Community Partnerships

- Coyote Counseling Center: Social-emotional therapeutic services.
- San Bernardino Community Church: Supports our athletic program, and provides mentoring services.
- Youth Justice Center: Depression, anger management, substance abuse, attendance, and parenting.
- Mock Interview Volunteers: Two local Community Churches, CSUSB/UCR, U.S. Military, and SBCUSD staff.
- San Bernardino Promise: Seniors who maintain A-G requirements are guaranteed acceptance at CSUSB.
- Victor Community Services: Social-emotional therapeutic services.

Student Support Team

In keeping in line with the Standards for Career Ready Practice and the goals of the San Bernardino City Unified School District, the SST is instrumental in the design, coordination, implementation, and evaluation of an equitable student support system that serves all students. This cohesive group works closely to provide services that address career and college readiness, career pathway training, as well as academic and social emotional success. Together, our team has 305+ years of service! The SST provides a variety of interventions to help encourage student success in these areas. These include Student Study Teams, Individual Education Plans, 504 plans, health services, campus safety, and of course academic guidance and social skill development.
